B21PH03DC- Sreenarayanaguru: A Historical Perspective

SET I Descriptive

- 1. Explain the education system in Travancore during Guru's time. Discuss Guru's early education, highlighting the key aspects and influences during his formative years.
- 2. Describe the socio-political scenario of Travancore during the 19th and early 20th centuries. Discuss the feudal system, slavery, judicial system, taxation policies, and their impact on society during that period.



B21PH01SE- Moral Dilemmas and Ethical Decision Making

SET I (Descriptive)

- 1. Distinguish different ethical theories; deontological theory, consequentialist theory and virtue theory. Elaborate ethical dilemma.
- 2. What is an ethical principle? Explain major ethical principles, beneficence, non-maleficence, autonomy and justice with real life examples of their application.
- 3. What is the foundational principle of utilitarianism? Elaborate the utilitarian philosophy with its pros and cons in the field of modern development.
- 4. Elaborate any five verses from Anukampa Dashakam.
- 5. Analyse the role of purity (Pancha Suddhi) in achieving peace and spiritual well-being according to Sree Narayana Guru's teachings. How can the practice of five purities (Dehashuddhi, Vaakshuddhi, Manahshuddhi, Indriyashuddhi, and Grahashuddhi) impact an individual's life?

SET II (Analytical)

- 1) In the food chain, one organism eats another organism in the environment. The world exists in this order of events in an ecosystem. If that is the case, do you support an absolute non-violence on animals in Jainism, Buddhism and Sreenarayanaguru's Philosophy? What is your take on killing of animals for the sake of food by humans? Can we live without absolutely harming other organisms? How would the universe look like without organisms killing each other and eating? Critically evaluate.
- 2) Guru refined Advaita philosophy and took it to the social realm for social reformation and justice. Advaitic philosophy promotes non-dualism which means that there is 'no two' or that there is 'only one undivided without a second'. Explain the essence of

- Advaitic philosophy and Guru's critical reinterpretation of the same with its focus on the concept of 'aparan'. How did Guru connect the concepts of non-duality and equality in his philosophy and how is it relevant today?
- 3) Ethical egoism prioritises self-benefit and ethical altruism prioritises others' well-being. Are both important on occasions? Which theory do you support and why? Give a critical interpretation.
- 4) Aim of Guru's philosophy is self-knowledge or self-realization. The self-knowledge or self-realization is also an important aspect of Indian philosophical schools. How this is distinct from factual cognition? Analyse
- 5) Explore the concept of Maya in Indian Philosophy especially in Narayana Guru's philosophy and its role in obscuring the truth of non-dual consciousness. Does ignorance lead us necessarily to evils? If that is the case, even the knowledgeable section of the society also promotes hatred and violence. Critically evaluate.
