Assignment Questions Semester I - (Major Course)

INTRODUCTION TO SOCIOLOGY (SGB24SO101MC)

Each set of Assignments will consist of 5 (five) questions and learners shall choose any one from each set. Each Assignment carries 15 marks.

SET I -Descriptive

1. Discuss the emergence of sociology and its socio political background.

(Hint: Briefly explain scientific revolution, growth of science and technology, twin revolution, intellectual force and the role of Auguste Comte in the development of sociology.)

2. Elaborate the definition, meaning and characteristics of Society, community Association and Organization.

(Hint: Briefly introduce the concepts: society, community, association, and organization, highlighting their importance in sociology.)

3. Describe the concepts of marriage, family, and kinship in sociology. Explain their types, functions, and significance in contemporary society.

(Hint: Define the three key concepts, discuss their types, characteristics, significance, and the changes that have occurred in them over time.)

4. 'Socialisation transforms a biological being into a social being', Identify and discuss the agents of socialisation.

(Hint: Discuss what is socialisation, how it facilitates the transformation, list and explain each agent involved in this transformation)

5. Discuss major theories of social change.

(Hint: Relate evolutionary, diffusionist, linear and cyclical theories to significant observable changes around you.)

SET II - Analytical

1. How do sociological imagination and common sense help us to understand society? Explain their importance with examples from everyday life.

(Hint: Explain what is sociological imagination, the difference between sociological imagination and common sense and give examples from daily life.)

2. Imagine you are observing people in different social settings—at home, school, or a workplace. How do their roles and status influence their behavior and interactions?

(Hint: Explain the concepts of role and status in sociology and highlight their importance in understanding social interactions and relationships and analyse these dynamics with examples.)

3. Social control is a mechanism by which members conform to the norms of society: Consider a day in your life and assess how public opinion and coercion act as informal and formal agents of social control.


(Hints: Discuss what is social control and the need for it, now recall a day in your life and analyse how public opinion and coercion manifest in your day to day activities.)

4. Analyse how folkways and mores perpetuate culture.

(Hint: Briefly explain the concepts, identify the prevalent and accepted practices, correlate how these practices facilitate and continue culture.)

5. Taking into consideration the versatile nature of India, assess how the cultural factors and technological factors correlate to facilitate social change?

(Hints: Discuss briefly the diverse profile of India, what are the cultural and technological factors that lead to social change, critically view the same with the dynamic shift in traditional nature of India.)

Course Title: Social Formations in World History

Course Code: SGB24HS131MI

Two sets of assignments are given for each course, the first set is descriptive and the second set is analytical. Each set of Assignments will consist of 5 (five) questions and learners shall choose any one from each set. Each Assignment carries 15 marks.

SET 1 - Descriptive

1. Describe the modes and means of production in early societies and their impact on social organisation.

Instructions: Provide a detailed description of the different modes of production in early human societies, such as hunting-gathering, agrarian, and pastoral systems. Discuss how these modes influenced social structures, class divisions, and the development of early civilisations.

2. Explain the relationship between private property, surplus production, and appropriation in ancient societies.

Instructions: Discuss the concept of private property in the context of early agricultural societies. Explain how surplus production was created and appropriated, and its implications for class formation, power dynamics, and social inequality.

3. Describe the key features of slave societies, focusing on the role of slaves as a commodity and source of labour.

Instructions: Provide an overview of slave societies, detailing the economic and social role of slaves. Explain how slaves were treated as commodities and how their labour contributed to the economies of societies like Ancient Greece and Rome, as well as in colonial contexts.

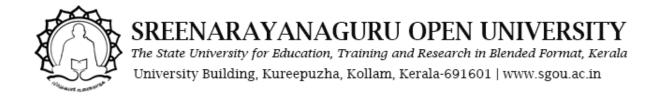
4. Examine the causes and consequences of the Industrial Revolution in Europe, with a focus on its impact on the social structure and labour systems.

- Support your analysis with specific examples and quotes from the literature. Use direct textual evidence to illustrate and reinforce your points.
- Move beyond mere summary and engage in critical analysis. Interpret the significance of the literary elements, such as themes, characters, and symbols.

SET 1 - Descriptive

1. How do Kerala's historical landmarks contribute to its tourism industry? Discuss the impact of their heritage and historical importance with examples.

SET 1 (Descriptive)

- 1. Describe the process of creating and hosting a web page in detail. Provide examples to support your explanation.
- 2. Explain the different types of network topologies (Bus, Ring, Star, and Mesh) with examples. Compare their advantages and disadvantages. Provide diagrams to illustrate the topologies in your explanation.
- 3. Discuss the importance of practicing cyber ethics on social media platforms and also describe the steps to evaluate the credibility of information found online, and explain why it is essential in the digital age.

SET II (Analytical)

- 1. How does the interaction between system software (e.g., operating systems, utility programs, and language processors) and application software contribute to the overall functionality and performance of a computer system? Provide examples to support your analysis.
- 2. Investigate the impact of emerging threats such as ransomware and phishing campaigns on organizational network security. Analyze how proactive measures like cybersecurity training, endpoint security, and AI-based threat detection systems contribute to mitigating these evolving risks.
- 3. Given an organization is assigned a Class C IPv4 address of 200.1.2.0, and the network needs to be subnetted into two subnets. The subnet mask used is 255.255.255.192
 - a. Explain the steps involved in dividing the network into two subnets.
 - b. How would you determine the range of valid host addresses for each subnet after subnetting?
 - c. If a packet is sent from a device within the second subnet (200.1.2.128), how does the router identify that the destination address (e.g., 200.1.2.20) belongs to the first subnet?
 - d. Discuss the potential issues of using Classful addressing in modern networking and how Classless Inter-Domain Routing (CIDR) addresses these issues.
- 4. Conduct a detailed study of any three major cloud-based data storage systems that are publicly available. Compare their features and highlight how they support big data analytics use cases.

General Instructions

- The descriptive assignment requires the learners to comprehensively explain the theories or concepts supported by relevant facts and examples. In contrast, the analytical assignment demands critical evaluation based on well-supported arguments, leading to informed conclusions.

Assignment Format

- The assignment should contain a title page, introduction, content (explaining theories or concepts for the descriptive set or analysing the theories and concepts for the analytical set), conclusion and bibliography.
- The assignment must be handwritten.

Two sets of assignments are given for each course, the first set is descriptive and the second set is analytical. Each set of Assignments will consist of 5 (five) questions and learners shall choose any one from each set. Each Assignment carries 15 marks

Set 1- Descriptive

- 1. Explain the key features of Fundamental Rights in the Indian Constitution. How do they protect citizens' rights?
- 2. Discuss the role of Fundamental Duties and the Directive Principles of State Policy in promoting social justice in India. Provide examples of how they are implemented.
- 3. Describe the significance of the Bharatiya Nyaya Samhita (Indian Penal Code), Code of Civil Procedure, and the Indian Evidence Act in the Indian legal system. How do these laws contribute to justice and fairness?
- 4. Discuss the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005, and the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) Act, 2005. How do these laws protect vulnerable groups in society?
- 5. Explain the concept of legal aid under the Legal Services Authorities Act. How do Lok Adalats contribute to the accessibility of justice in India?

Set 2- Analytical

- 1. Analyze the challenges in the implementation of Fundamental Rights in India. What are the major limitations faced by the judiciary and citizens in enforcing these rights?
- 2. Evaluate the effectiveness of the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989 in addressing social discrimination and violence. Are there any shortcomings in the implementation of this law?
- 3. Critically analyze the difference between cognizable and non-cognizable offences, and between bailable and non-bailable offences. How does this distinction affect the criminal justice system in India?
- 4. Assess the role of the police in maintaining law and order in India. Do you think the existing police system is effective in handling public security, or are reforms needed? Justify your answer.
- 5. Analyze the impact of the Consumer Protection Act, 2019 and the Right to Information Act, 2005 on empowering citizens. How do these laws contribute to transparency and accountability in the Indian system?
